


A MESSAGE FROM THE MEDICAL DIRECTOR

"But thou, O Daniel, shut up the words, and seal the book, even to the time of the end: many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall be increased." Daniel 12:4.

In a very remarkable way, this Scripture is being fulfilled before our eyes. With the twenty-inch telescope, some of the mysteries of the heavens are being opened up before us. With the electron microscope, the ultra-microscopic worlds can be photographed and studied. Increasing knowledge of nuclear physics is enabling man to harness and utilize undreamed of powers in nature. In every field of engineering and science, rapid advancements are being made. In no field of human endeavor is knowledge unfolding more rapidly than in the field of medicine. Because of the thousands of scientific articles coming from the research centers and clinicians, it is impossible for any one man to keep up with the advancements which are being made.

Madison Sanitarium and Hospital is endeavoring to keep pace with the time by associating together a group of physicians who specialize in various fields of medicine. During the past year, three physicians have been added to the group: Dr. G. E. Horsley, whose work is in Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat; Dr. Naomi Pittman, in the field of Pediatrics: and Dr. Margaret Horsley, in Obstetrics. A school of Anesthesia is being conducted, and it is making an outstanding contribution to the work of the institution. This is being ably directed by Mr. Bernard V. Bowen. An effort is also being made to keep the hospital abreast of the times by the addition of diagnostic and therapeutic technical equipment.

At the same time we are endeavoring to keep up with modern developments, we have not lost sight of the fact that there are great fundamental principles and simple techniques for treatment which will never be outmoded. The specialty group, important as it is, is only a part of a team whose great purpose is to put the entire church to work; for "we have come to the time when every member of the church should take hold of the medical work." It is with this objective in mind that the workers at Madison Sanitarium and Hospital carry on their duties. Physicians, nurses, dietitians, well-qualified technicians and others, are being trained and are entering into the program as workers and leaders. Their first

endeavor is to make their own day-by-day work evangelical in nature.

ARTS AND SCIENCES

The Pace Course has been earnestly entered into by a group of students who desire to make accounting their life work, they are gaining experience in the various departments where accounts and balance sheets predominate. The Medical Secretarial and Secretarial students are receiving first hand practice in their chosen field outside the classroom. A B.S. is obtainable in Business Education by taking any one of these three.

The department of education and psychology is conducted for the purpose of preparing teachers in the fields of elementary and secondary teacher training. Two specific needs are met in the offering of the department; a one-year course provides for those who desire a short, well-organized preparation for immediate service but which will apply on a more complete preparation later; and a two-year course which may or may not be combined with work leading to a college degree.

An earnest, enthusiastic group each year enter Teacher-training recognizing the wonderful privilege which God places as second to none that of guiding and directing young people during the formative period that they may in turn be "laborers together with God" in His almighty program for the salvation of man.


The tool subject of contact with our fellowman, the English language is basic to working with and for them. The objective of this department is to so personalize instruction that each student will be directly aided in overcoming his own handicap for effective expression in both the written and oral field.

Upon the fundamentals of the Word of God is built the more detailed instruction in doctrine and the practice of Christian missionary work. The history of man is correlated with the work of God on the earth so the student is led to see in both the affairs of man and Heaven the ultimate success of the plans of the Creator —and how the student can best fit into the eternal objective. Minors are obtained in Religious Education and Social Science.

The Christian objective in education is sought from the Sciences. The student is trained to recognize the known fundamentals of life processes and structure; and how the elements of creation can be used by man in contributing to improving the conditions under which he and his fellow men live, and how these forces can be used to make easier the objective of the promulgation of the gospel. There is a sincere desire to aid students to find their pleasures in God's creation rather than man's devisings. The Science major will be obtainable largely by those who have completed the course in Medical Technology, Minors in Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Mathematics may be secured by those who complete a college course in one of the obtainable major fields.

It is our firm belief that any phase of music should be pursued primarily for the service and glory of God. Music in school need not be confined in the fine arts. If music is to find the place in our lives that God intended for it, we must make it a practical thing in which all can participate in and enjoy. There will be opportunity for students not taking a major in music to actively participate in the music program of the institution by joining in the church choir, a capella choir, band and other activities the music department may foster.

Beginning with the school year 1950-1951, there is to be offered a combined work-music curriculum in which one can learn to perform the practical duties of life and at the same time






