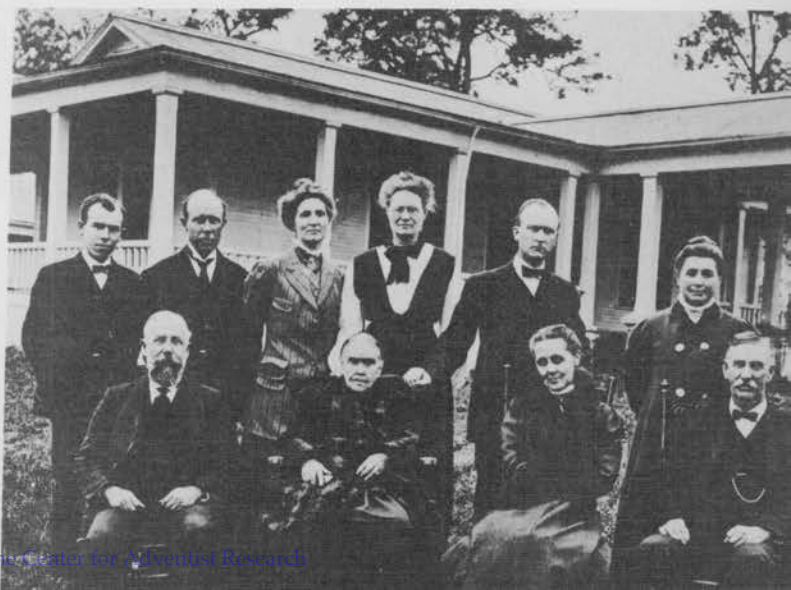
On Steamer "Morning Star,"
on the Cumberland River,
June 13, 1904

Elder A. G. Daniells,
Washington, D.C.

Dear Brother Daniells:

We are returning from our trip up the river to look for land suitable for school work. We went from Nashville to Carthage, a distance of about one hundred and seventy miles by the river and seventy-eight miles by rail. We looked at several places, but the fertile land up the river is altogether too high in price for us to think of purchasing it for school purposes.

Tomorrow morning we shall reach Edgefield Junction, which is only twelve miles from Nashville. We shall stay there the rest of the day; for we wish to visit a farm which is for sale at Madison, about nine miles from Nashville, and two and a half miles from the railway. It is said that this farm contains nearly one hundred acres of good bottom land, more than one hundred acres of second quality agricultural land suitable for grain and fruit, and about two hundred acres of pasture land. We think that it can be purchased for about twelve thousand dollars. It is said that there is on it over two thousand dollars' worth of stock and farm implements. I desire to look at this farm, and if it be the will of the Lord, I shall do so tomorrow afternoon. The farm has a roomy house, barns, and other buildings, and two and a half miles of good stone fence. Considering its advantages, its price is less than anything else we have seen in this part of Tennessee.

When the message of educational reform came to us, first in the early "fifties," then more pointedly in 1874, the classically trained educators among us were slow to grasp its meaning.

The call for a shift from the classical to the practical emphasis—the heart and the hand as well as the head—was only a revival and a recognition of the principles of true Christian education advocated by the great pioneers in educational reform some forty years earlier.

In 1891 Mrs. E. G. White went to Australia and there demonstrated in the Avondale school what the workers in America had been slow to comprehend. Returning in 1900, she lent her influence to moving Battle Creek College out of the city onto the land.

To further exemplify the educational reform principles, the president of the relocated Battle Creek College, Professor E. A. Sutherland, and his co-worker, Percy T. Magan, accompanied Mrs. White and her group to the South in June of 1904, where, under her inspiration and counsel, the site of Madison College was selected. Later that summer, "Mother" Druillard and Miss Bessie DeGraw joined them; and with Elders Haskell, Butler, and W. C. White, the College was founded. Mrs. White became a charter member of the Board and remained a member until the year before her death in 1915.

Dr. P. P. Claxton, former U.S. Commissioner of Education, writing in a small pamphlet some years ago, praised very highly the work of Madison.

He wrote: "It [Madison College] is located on hills overlooking a great bend of the Cumberland River ten miles above

Nashville. The sweeping view across hills and valleys in all directions is inspiring. Still more inspiring, however, is the vision of those who founded the school and who . . . have wrought unselfishly, persistently, and wisely for its development.

“Here students, teachers, and directors, working together, constitute a self-supporting, democratic, educational community, the like of which I do not know—a fulfillment of the hopes and dreams of educators and philanthropists.

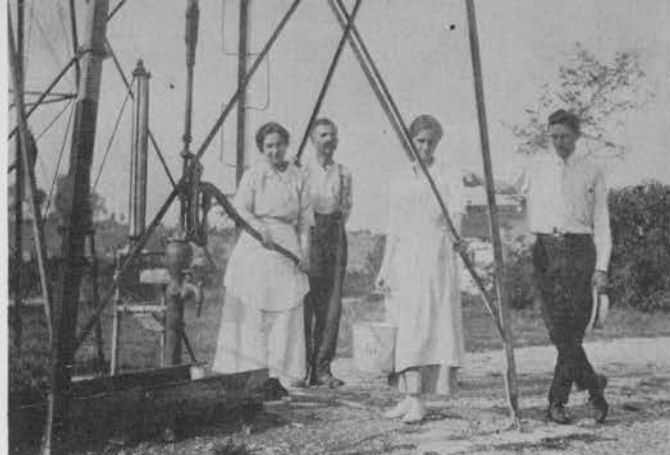
“To know the school and to feel its fine spirit, one must see it and live with it. In no other way can its great purpose, its soundness of theory, its correctness of method, be understood. In no other way can the simple life, earnest devotion and effective industry of students, teachers, and directors be fully appreciated. . . .

“I have seen many schools of all grades in many countries, but none more interesting than this. Nowhere else have I seen so much accomplished with so little money. . . .

“The Nashville Agricultural Normal Institute [Madison College] was founded by . . . five teachers and eleven students. Its only visible endowment was four hundred acres of land, naturally fertile, but badly worn, and some dilapidated farm buildings, purchased by the founders and paid for with their own money—all they had.

“A greater, but invisible, endowment was the strong purpose and indomitable energy of the founders, and a faith that has proved itself by its works.

“The purpose of the school, expressed in its charter, is ‘the training and teaching of missionaries, teachers, and farm-

ers who are willing to devote at least a portion of their time to unselfish, unremunerative labor for the glory of God and the benefit of their fellowmen.’”

The objectives of Madison College are, as they have always been, the training of lay men and women for effective self-supporting service in the great work of God’s remnant church. It is recognized that this work is auxiliary to and in cooperation with that of the church-supported ministry in this one great common cause.

In the light of these objectives, our present task stands out in distinct relief: “Out of the cities, out of the cities!” declared Mrs. E. G. White. “This is the message the Lord has been giving me.” (*Life Sketches*, p. 409.)

Today there are thousands of our people who want to, and will, leave the cities. They want to get onto the land. But they do not know how to get there nor how to earn their livelihood when they do.

As the College for the training of lay men for lay work, Madison recognized this as her task. She must be the gateway from city life to successful country living for hundreds of our people of all ages. And as time goes on, this task will increase.

There are about fifty daughter institutions in the South and elsewhere, some in foreign lands. There will be many more, and they will have a large part in the closing work of the church.

Madison College has grown to be a very large institution; but she is keenly conscious of her sacred ancestry, and she is humbly determined to remain true to the great principles of educational reform that gave her birth.

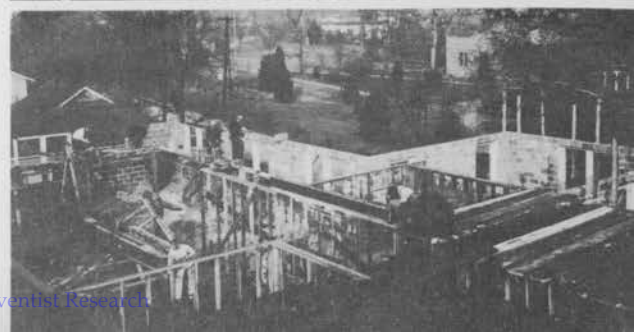
