Gideons Present Bibles to Nurses

Sixty-five New Testaments were presented to nurses and anesthesia students by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Gideon Society at an impressive service at chapel on July 22.

Mrs. James Kier and Mrs. Quay Morgan, representing the Ladies' Auxiliary of this worldwide organization, were in charge of the chapel program.

Mrs. Morgan explained the work of the Gideons, an organization of Christian business men who place Bibles in hotels and hospitals all over the world. The Ladies' Auxiliary, composed of wives, sisters, and daughters of the Gideons, furnishes New Testaments and Psalms to nurses and nursing students in hospitals.

Mrs. Morgan gave her own testimony of what the Word of God has meant to her. Then Miss Petra Sukau, junior nurse, and Miss Virginia Davidson, clinical instructor, both told personal experiences of bringing hope and comfort to patients by reading to them from the Bible.



Students Conduct Five-week Voice of Youth Rally

Madison College youth are experiencing the joys of sharing their faith as they participate in the Voice of Youth Crusade, which is now entering its fourth week.

This series of evangelistic meetings, sponsored by the local M. V. society, has been the work of the young people from start to finish. From the pitching of the tent to the speaking—everything has been done by young people.

Attendance has been good from the beginning. On some nights it has been necessary to bring additional chairs and benches to seat the audience.

Beginning July 28 and continuing throughout August, meetings are held four nights a week—Sunday, Tuesday, Friday, Saturday. The tent is pitched at the entrance to the college, on the corner of Larkin Springs Road and Sanitarium Drive.

The attractive sign calls the attention of passers-by to the meetings. Also every week thousands of handbills are distributed, inviting people to hear and see Christian youth witness for their Saviour.

The order of the meetings is as follows: Organ meditations by Carol McClure or Mary Lou Sullins begin at seven o'clock. At seven-thirty a Bible film especially for

the children is shown by Mr. Leslie Morris. Then follows a spirited song service directed by Mr. Winston Ferris or Mr. Gilbert Jorgensen, climaxed by an instrumental or vocal number. Often a Bible quiz is conducted. On Friday nights an 18-voice robed choir conducted by Vincent Mitzelfelt furnishes two numbers. Pianists are Carol Hilgers, Larry Mixon, and June Davidson.

After the singing of the theme song, "Make the Book Live in Me," announcements, and offering, a panel of four or five youth presents the topic of the evening.


