Large Enrollment Expected in Fall

Prospects are for a larger enrollment next fall for Madison College than for many years, according to President William Sandborn.

Concerning the outlook for the coming year, Dr. Sandborn says: "Madison College faces the school year 1958-59 with the greatest of optimism. The applications to date far exceed those of previous years.

"To date a total of 163 new students have been accepted for the school year, beginning in September. The list is composed of 18 married students, 57 single college women, 49 single college men, 20 academy girls, and 19 academy boys.

"About 40 of these students are already on the campus, working up a credit for the fall quarter. During the next two months before school opens, probably another fifty will be accepted. We should have a total of 450 students in the college and academy this fall."
