76 Will Graduate Saturday Night

Wasiotans Camp at Fall Creek Falls

A weekend camping trip to Fall Creek Falls State Park provided nineteen members of Wasiota Club with an experience they will not soon forget. The boys left soon after three a.m. on Friday, August 1, and returned Sunday, August 3.

Swimming and hiking featured the first day's activities, after they had set up camp.

This park is distinguished by one of the highest waterfalls in the South and two less lofty cataraacts, which are perhaps even more beautiful. Fall Creek Falls leaps over a precipice perhaps 275 feet high into a circular chasm. Here it forms a tiny lake, overflowing into the rocky bed of a spectacular canyon. The other two falls, side by side, some distance away, do the same. The two gorges thus formed join where the streams unite to make their way down the side of Cumberland Mountain into lovely Sequatchie Valley. Cables provided by the park enable amateur mountain climbers to scramble down the cliff to the bottom of the canyon.

The college bus served as chapel for Friday evening vespers.

Singing and the study of the Sabbath school lesson enlivened the ride Sabbath morning across to Laurelbrook Academy on near-by Walden Ridge. Here several of the group took part in the Sabbath services.

They returned to the park in the late afternoon, where they resumed their activities till Sunday morning.

Pitman Writes of Jungle Trips

(Note: Tui Pitman is spending the summer in Peru with missionaries in that region. Space will not permit printing all the letter recently received by his mother, but the excerpts will give a little idea of the unusual vacation he is enjoying this summer.)

"Just got back last night from the jungle. Boy, we surely went into the heart of the jungle. I got some real good pictures. The missionaries there are real missionaries. . . .

"To get to San Raymon we had to go over mountains that were 15,000 feet high. We were so high that I could hardly breathe. . . .

"From San Raymon we took a plane. It took about an hour's flying time going into the jungle. . . . Then we boarded the boat and headed out into the river which is a branch of the Amazon. . . . On the way down we saw crocodiles, and parrots flew over our heads. When we got to the mission, we really had a welcoming committee on the bank. . . .

"Mr. Barry, a friend of Bill's from Kodak Film, came along. He brought his cameras with him and he really did shoot up the film.

"The day we got there we had a meeting. I played my saxophone for song service. Boy, they liked that. That night a tiger got into the chicken coop and started to kill some chickens. An Indian came with his bow and arrow and shot it. I've got a picture of it. . . .

"Next afternoon we had an Ingathering program, and Bill preached to them. Then we took up a collection for Ingathering. I have never seen people give the way they did. They gave from 50 to 100 soles. Fifty soles is five days' work for them. They work hard to get it, too. They work cutting down trees for rubber companies.

"While we were there, one Indian came up and asked to be baptized. They have 250 members there. . . .

"This Mr. Barry is not an Adventist, but he was really impressed. He said that he did not know the kind of work that Adventists did. Next month he is going to the States, and he is going to show the pictures we took to the Seventh-day Adventist church in Kansas City and give a talk about what an outsider thinks of Seventh-day Adventists. He is a big shot in the Kodak Company. I bet he really gives the publicity about Adventists. He was really impressed. . . .

"I surely have seen a lot of missionary life and I think I like it. . . .

"If people knew just how little things make the people here happy. Take the Indians in the jungle. Just a safety pin will make them happy. If they could see how a little money goes far down here and the way the Indians give that don't have much money, they might give more to the mission offerings. If they could see the change that comes into these Indians when they become Christians, they would give more."
