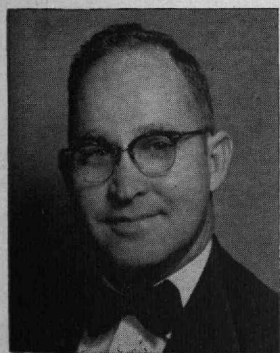

Sixty-three Graduate at Annual Commencement

H. R. Lynd Appointed Dean of College

Seventy-nine Degrees, Diplomas, and Certificates Presented

Mr. Homer Lynd was appointed dean of Madison College at a meeting of the directors on July 21, 1960. For the past three years Mr. Lynd has been college registrar.

Mr. Lynd, a native of Alabama, attended Madison College in 1939 and 1940. He entered Peabody College in 1946 and received his B.S. degree, with a major in chemistry and biology. Later he received his M.A., with a major in biology. In 1950 he was granted the M.Ed. degree, with a major in school administration. He has done additional work since then.

His teaching experience began at Highland Academy from 1949 to 1951. From 1951 to 1956 he taught at several high schools. He has also served as principal of Nashville Junior Academy.

Mrs. Lynd, the former Theresa Peters, is a graduate of Madison College. She is a head nurse in the Maternity Ward of Madison Sanitarium and Hospital. The Lynds have one daughter, Debbie, who is eight and a half years old.

Sixty-three members of the 1960 graduating class received degrees, diplomas, and certificates from eight different courses of study at the annual commencement of Madison College on Saturday night, August 20.

Eight received certificates from the School of Anesthesia; twenty-seven, B.S. degrees; four, certificates in Medical Records; five, certificates in Medical Technology; four, certificates in Practical Physical Therapy; twenty-six, diplomas in Nursing; one, certificate from two-year Secretarial; and four, certificates in X-ray.

Chaplain Robert L. Mole, of the United States Navy, addressed the graduates, admonishing them to use their God-given talents to their maximum benefit to their fellowmen.

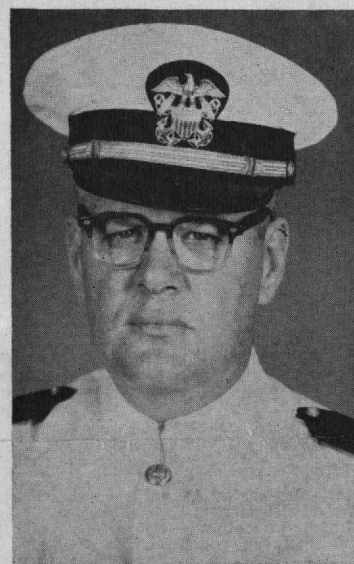
Commencement weekend began with the consecration service on Friday night, when Elder H. K. Christman, from the Pacific Press, spoke.

On Sabbath morning Elder Ben Glanzer preached the baccalaureate sermon. Mrs. Bob W. Silver was superintendent of the Sabbath school for the day, which was conducted by the senior class.

Chaplain Mole, the commencement speaker, is an alumnus of Madison College, having graduated

in 1944. He is also a graduate of the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary, having received M.A. and B.D. degrees. He has also pursued graduate studies in Clinical Education and Pastoral Care. He has served as a college administrator, professor, pastor, and director of church work on the island of Cyprus and in the Holy Land, in the Middle East Division of Seventh-day Adventists.

Chaplain Mole pioneered the Adventist Naval chaplaincy, being the first Adventist to serve as a Navy chaplain. During his tours of duty he served in the following places: Newport, Rhode Island; Camp Lejeune, North Carolina;

Bainbridge, Maryland; Okinawa; the Philippines; Japan; and the Great Lakes Naval Training Center.

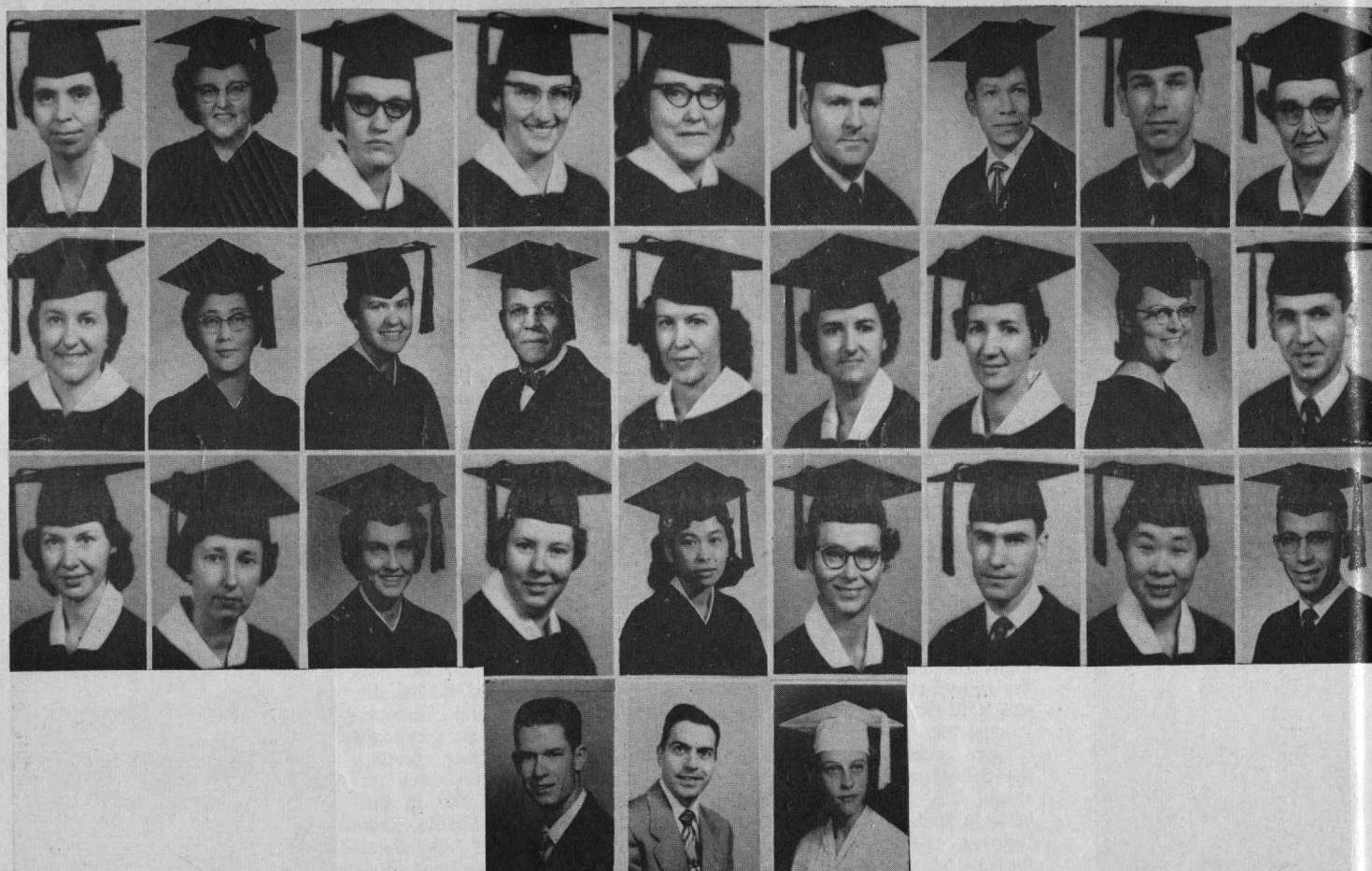
