Graduating Classes Present New Program Clock to College

The graduates of 1962, recalling the "bell troubles" of the past, have given the college a new Simplex program unit. This unit will guarantee orderly scheduling of classes. The master clock unit includes a seven-day calendar device providing automatic silencing of signals during unwanted periods. Another interesting factor is that new schedules may be quickly and easily set. Switches are provided on all three circuits for independent manual operation of each program circuit.

With the three-circuit unit it will be possible to set up a separate bell system for the elementary, secondary, and college, should the need arise. The graduates of 1962 are to be commended for this fine, practical, and badly needed gift.

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Elementary School Holds Open House

Student Missionary Spends Busy Summer at Chiapas, Mexico

A recent letter from John Bryant, Madison College student missionary to Mexico, lets his friends know what a busy man he is. The MADI-SONIAN shares with its readers some extracts from John's letter:

Physical Therapist Joins Hospital Staff

Mr. C. B. Rayburn, registered physical therapist from Loma Linda, has joined the staff of Madison Hospital and Sanitarium.

As the hospital plans for the future, with the construction of the new hospital building, much attention is being given to adequate facilities in physical therapy, according to Mr. Robert Morris, administrator. "One of the first steps has been to secure a qualified individual," he adds, "who is well qualified to guide in the formation of the new department."

Mr. Rayburn attended La Sierra College and Loma Linda University, from which he received his degree in physical therapy. His affiliation took him into five different hospitals, where the emphasis was on different types of rehabilitative therapies. His specialized training has been in the fields of low back injuries, psychiatric patient problems, spinal injuries, polio an d stroke cases, orthopedic problems, and medical ailments, with special attention to tuberculosis cases.

Following his affiliation, Mr. Rayburn joined with the Oregon State Industrial Accident Commission.

The hospital staff realizes that Mr. Rayburn's service here at Madison will be a definite asset to the medical staff, as well as to the community. Mr. and Mrs. Rayburn and their three children are now living on the campus.

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"I am doing just about everything you can imagine—from digging ditches to assisting in operations. I even filled my own tooth. I guess I have to practice on somebody.

"Most of the surgery here is around fiesta time when everybody in the tribe gets drunk; then they start cutting themselves up with their knives. We have about three or four a week like that now. Fiesta is at different times for each town, so we are in business the year round.

"Not long ago a priest stood on the road above our establishment and put a curse on us, but the Lord has blessed us more than ever as the word is spreading of our work here. The governor of the state is a medical doctor himself and he sends many people out here who are quite well-to-do.

"I am teaching some classes in O. R. technique. They put me in charge of surgery as far as setting up and scheduling goes. I am working on a more efficient way to set up and have everything ready to go when needed.

"I am sure glad I did not ride that motorcycle down here; these roads are really something. The gas is not too good either. We are constantly draining the sediment bowls on the cars and trucks."

John, junior nurse at Madison Hospital and Sanitarium, was appointed student missionary this spring by the MV society. He has been spending the summer at the Yerba Buena Mission with Mr. and Mrs. Ray Comstock.

Nature Study Is Theme of Exhibits

As the guests arrived, Gary Herman welcomed them, gave them programs, and directed them to the first classroom. Materials secured especially for this purpose included the Science Research Associates reading and spelling laboratories. Measurable gains of as high as two grade levels were made in certain areas during the eight weeks' session.

Student Teachers Assist

The summer program was directed by Mr. John E. Baker of the campus school. He was assisted by Mrs. Iris Harrel, teacher of grades 4 to 6 at the Highland Adventist School, and four student teachers who are under appointment to teach this fall. They are Miss Evelyn Aitken, who will teach at Jeffersonville, Indiana; Miss Margaret Ridler, who is returning to Paducah, Kentucky; Mrs. Juanita Smith, who will teach grades 3 to 7 at Cedar Grove, Tennessee; and Miss Carolyn Heer, who graduates August 18 with a degree in Elementary Education and who will teach at Henderson, Kentucky.

Students attending the summer school came from the Boulevard Adventist School, Neely's Bend Public School, Old Center Public School, Warner Public School, and Madison College Elementary School.

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
