# Spiritual Emphasis Week at Madison Hospital

"Health, Heart, and Healing Hands That Care" was the theme of "Spiritual Emphasis Week" at Madison Hospital on February 16-20. Four daily programs were held in Gant Hall so that each shift could attend. According to Judy Silva, director of Nursing Service, and program coordinator, the purpose of the week was not only to acquaint employees with Madison Hospital's philosophy and history of health care, but to give them a chance to interact on the subject of "Healing Relationships."

Among the speakers was hospital chaplain, Dr. Robert Hirst, who covered the Adventist philosphy on diet, healthful living, and health education.

Jan Rushing, regional vice-president for Adventist Health System, brought a bit of history concerning the early days of Madison HERITAGE ROOMRural Sanitarium (as it was called at first). A Laymen's Extension Leaguenes White Librariew years after the school, Nashville P. F. A., Chunky, Miss. Oct. 15-17/S UNIVERSIA griculture Normal Institute, was established in 1904, the first cottages were built for a sanitarium.

Buildings and beds were added until the first 11 beds expanded to 220 by 1950. Later, new North, South, East and West wings were added. Madison Hospital is now licensed for 307 beds.

To the delight of his hearers, Mr. Rushing reminisced on his days as an M.C. student. He said he had worked in every department of the hospital. Jan's wife, Patsy Wilson, graduated with a B.S. in nursing at M.C. in 1957, and is on the teaching staff in the Department of Nursing at SMC.

- "Dr. Joe", only son of E. A. Sutherland, is still on the staff of Madison Hospital, and "E. A."s granddaughter, Mrs. Claudia Rose, is director of continuing education. (She is the daughter of Bob and Stella Sutherland, who live in Goodlettsville.) Bernard Bowen, former director of Anesthesia, was the first baby born at Madison S-H. His home is still at Madison.
- Penny (Tucker) Bidwell, of the hospital P.R. Department, came to the alumni office to borrow pictures of the old sanitarium.
   Penny's mother and father graduated from M.C. Her father died a few years ago. Her mother, the former Elaine Leslie, lives in Bradenton, FL. Penny and her mother have a fond regard for old Madison.

# "Old Madison" Is Not Forgotten No, Madison Is Not Dead

It would be extremely difficult to eradicate worldwide knowledge of, and admiration for, "old Madison." Several times a year since this editor came in 1960 there have been letters, phone calls, and visitors seeking information on Madison College and Sanitarium. The quest went on even after the college closed in 1964. In fact a good many people didn't know it was closed. Requests for transcripts still come to Madison (instead of S.M.C.), Collegedale, TN., and occasionally an inquiry comes regarding enrolling in Madison College.

In the December 1980 SURVEY we reported visits to the Madison Campus by three people from Japan and one man from Australia. We did not have space to tell of other indications that "old Madison" and its philosophy is not forgotten. Following is a list of incidents in 1980.

- In February, 1981, a brother in the Fiji Islands wrote for a booklet by Elder J. H. N.
   Tindall, and other booklets on selfsupporting and medical missionary work.
   Also he asked for "Materials which are being taught there" [at Madison].
- In June of last year a Mrs. Watson of the nursing school in Nigeria, West Africa, wrote an urgent request, asking where she could get copies of Gulde to Learn How to Be Well by Julius G. White, or similar books. We had to tell her that J. G. White's books were out of print. We did suggest she might write the G.C. Health

Department for a free copy of the Rood-Lingham books, Taking Care of the Family's Health. (Margaret Brown and Ruth Lingham had donated copies of the 2-volume set to the G.C. Health Department and alumni office several years ago.)

• (Mrs. Judy Leeper phoned from Riverside, CA. to get information on Ellen White and the self-supporting work to fulfill an assignment for a class at LaSierra Campus, LLU. We sent some booklets. Judy thanked us, and gave more information on her project and her family.)

I am working on credential renewals for teaching at the elementary level. The class I am taking on the life of Ellen G. White will be transferable to a masters program at a later date. My paper is dealing with self-supporting work, what was happening in America as a whole during this time, what Mrs. White's views were on it, and what is happening now in regard to it. My husband, James Leeper, taught a few business classes at Madison while Ralph Davidson was president in 1960-61. At the time he was assistant secretary-treasurer for the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference. . . . Our eldest son was born at Madison.

No, indeed, Madison is not dead. Within recent weeks this editor has been asked to check over a chapter on Madison in a forthcoming book on self-supporting work, also send information on the manufacture of soybean products at Madison. The latter inquiry came from Bill Shurtleff of Lafayette, CA. Bill and his wife, Akiko, have been doing research on soyfoods. They have authered eight books on the use of soyfoods in vegetarian diets. A half million have been sold (250,000 of the Tofu book).

Another disturbing factor was the fact that a fellow self-supporting American, Lon Cummings, was kidnapped by guerillas on Christmas, 1980, and released after almost a month in a weak, emaciated condition.

# **Everett R. Doolittle**

Madison's First Banker, Postmaster, & Merchant

When working on the MADISON SURVEY files, we have seen occasional references to Mr. Doolittle, first postmaster in the town of Madison, in regard to arrangements for the SURVEY when it was late or other irregularities occurred in publication.

The N.A.N.I. institution had a good relationship with Mr. Doolittle when he was postmaster, and also in his position as the first banker in Madison. We learned from an article in the Community News in 1977 that it all began during the year 1910 in a cigar box in his grocery store.

An article by Helen Peacher, secretary of Madison's First Bank, in the Madison Community News (2-24-77) gives this interesting information: "Madison's first bank was a cigar box." The article goes on to say that in 1910 E. R. Doolittle, postmaster and merchant at Madison station, was asked by some of the farmers to keep their cash and pay their farm hands each week. Doolittle was glad to do this as it brought business to his little one-room store, which had a post-office at one end.

We wanted to know a little more about Mr. Doolittle, so we asked Virginia Ellis about it. She started working at the Madison Bank and Trust Company (forerunner of the Madison branch of First American) in 1921 and continued until she retired in 1957, as cashier, then vice-president. When it became a branch of First American she was appointed assistant manager. Miss Ellis answered as follows:

"Everett R. Doolittle was postmaster at Madison, TN. for 35 years, from 1899 until 1934. He was also in the grocery business, and in 1913 he and a Nashville banker organized the Madison Bank and Trust Company. He asked the school teachers at that time to recommend a girl that could do bookkeeping and assume other responsibilities, and they suggested my sister, Izeldorah Ellis, who attended Draughn's Business College. When she graduated she was elected assistant cashier

in the bank and assistant postmaster in the postoffice. . . .

"Mr. Doolittle was active in civic and religious organizations, and admired the program being carried out by Dr. E. A. Sutherland, one of the founders of N.A.N.I. (Nashville Agricultural Normal Institute), which later became Madison College, and appreciated its influence in the community, as a college and sanitarium."

 On page 67 of the Golden Anniversary Album there is a picture of Dr. Sutherland cutting the ribbon for the opening of the bank that was used until the new larger First American bank was built in Madison.

From Cigar Box to 7000 Square Foot Building

The Madison Branch of First American Bank has grown and grown in its business operation until the building at Gallatin Road and Madison Street became much too small, so a larger structure was built behind it. On Dec. 19, 1980, a ribbon cutting ceremony was held for the 7,000 square foot building, which is now the largest of the 28 branch offices.

Present at the official opening were Miss Virginia Ellis and Anna White Doolittle, daughter of the late Everett Doolittle. The latter lives in Madison.

# Continuing Education for Anesthetists on Caribbean Cruise

The nurse-anesthetists course at Madison is now operated under a different plan and a new name. It is no longer operated by Madison Hospital, but by two anesthesiologists, Drs. Downs and Smith and by Director Stanley F. Sargeant. The school is now called Middle Tennessee School of Anesthesiology (M.T.S.A.)

The M.T.S.A. sponsored a continuing education course as part of a Caribbean Cruise on March 7-14. Dr. Wm. O. T. Smith and Stanley Sargeant were two of the instructors. Among the hundreds who went were Bernard and Dolly Bowen and nine other anesthetists who took their course at Madison.

JEROLD B. CRAW

Jerold B. Craw was born June 26, 1909 in Galesburg, Mich., and died Jan. 17, 1981, in LaVerkin, Utah. In 1932 he was married to Esther Fairchild, who preceded him in death in 1979. He attended Madison College in 1947 and after a nine year absence returned to an administrative position at Madison. During the following seven years he filled positions as maintenance supervisor, purchasing agent, food factory manager, and business manager.

Following a tenure at Loma Linda Foods he was called into the ministry in the Michigan Conference where he served three churches and as district ministerial director. In 1976 he answered a call to the Nevada-Utah Conference. While in the LaVerkin area he built his second church since entering the formal ministry.

He is survived by two sons--Joel and Raymond; and a daughter, Verda Westerman.

# DR. BYRON PATRICK

Byron Patrick passed away on June 4, 1980, in Oshawa, Ontario, Canada, at the age of 70 years. Dr. and Mrs. Patrick joined the Madison College Faculty in the mid-fifties, he as head of the Department of Social Science, and she as registrar of the college. They both taught at several Adventist colleges and also for a short period in public school.

#### JOSEPH ARLINGTON TUCKER

(Elder J. A. Tucker died at Highland Hospital Manor, Portland, TN., on Feb. 11, 1981. Funeral services were conducted by Frank Ricks and Mel Hillier. Pastor Ricks furnished us with obituary information. Tucker's wife, Josephine, remains in the Highland Hospital nursing home. She has been in poor health several years.)

Joseph A. Tucker was born in 1887 north of Palestine, TX. He finished his high school education at Keene Industrial Academy in 1913. He was united in marriage to Mary Josephine Wilson in Sept. 1914. They had two children--Margaret and Joseph, who both preceded him in death.

Joseph Tucker was ordained into the gospel ministry in 1922 and that year was appointed by the General Conference to be the "War chaplain" to our men in service. He traveled to the bases all over the States to encourage Adventist young men during this time in our nation's history.

In 1927, Elder Tucker became the President of Oakwood College. He remained at this position for ten years and was the last white president of that institution. While there, he recruited Dunbar Henri as a student, who later became a G. C. vice-president.

Elder Tucker was dean of men at Union College two years, for five years principal of Oak Park Academy in Iowa, and for ten years president of Oakwood Junior College at Huntsville, Ala. He spent a number of years as educational and M.V. secretary in several conferences.

In 1944 he received his Master's degree in vocational education at Iowa State College, and went to SMC, where he taught education, agriculture, and Bible, and Mrs. Tucker was dean of women. In 1949 the Tuckers came to Madison College, where he became dean and Mrs. Tucker was a teacher. He was always greatly interested in agriculture and Was head of the department at M.C.

In 1952, Elder and Mrs. Tucker retired and moved to Grundy County in Tennessee where he became so involved in the adult education program for the people of that county, that he was awarded a plaque and the title, "Mr. Adult Education of Grundy County." This was after his retirement.

He passed to his rest on Feb. 11, 1981. The world will sorely miss this great man, but now he rests from his labors awaiting the resurrection call.

He is survived by his wife, Josephine; his brother, A. J. Tucker of Watertown, Wisconsin; and three grandchildren.
