Homecoming Reminder June 18-20, 1982

We hope this will reach you in time to remind you again about Homecoming at Madison June 18-20. Letters and long distance calls are coming in and excitement is building up. In order to get this June SURVEY out quicker we are cutting it down to four pages, and have to leave out much material.

PROGRAM: Friday night speaker is Dr. Harry Mayden, director of education, Potomac Conference; and Sabbath morning, Elder K. H. Livesay, executive secretary, ASI; Sabbath afternoon, reports from Honor Classes. On Sunday morning we have arranged for a panel of health professionals to participate in a health workshop: Dr. Sheila Robertson, of Riverside Hospital; Darrell McWilliams, director of health education, Madison Hospital; three from Country Life Vegetarian Restaurant in Nashville, and others. Coordinated by Professor James Zeigler of Collegedale, TN.

MEALS and HOUSING: Two potluck meals will be served on Sabbath (dinner and supper). The hospital has stopped serving breakfast in the cafeteria, but does have a snack bar. You may wish to bring your own food for breakfast Sabbath and Sunday mornings. We have arranged for several rooms in the area, and are trying to fulfill all requests. It has been suggested that those who open their homes should be offered a token gift, such as \$10. (This is optional.)

DIRECTIONS: Madison is ten miles northeast of Nashville. Interstate 65 goes through Madison. Get off Exit 21 to Madison on Old Hickory Blvd., cross Gallatin, turn right at Delaware on Myatt Drive one block to (old) Old Hickory, turn left a few blocks to campus signs at Larkin Springs Road, then right, and you will soon see Madison Hospital and the Campus Church.

The Heritage House and alumni office is across from the hospital at 307 Sanitarium Road, where you can register Friday afternoon if you arrive early enough. My days on Madison Campus are a cherished memory. I was not privileged to be a part of the Madison plan of education until during the closing days. But for many years I had appreciated Dr. Sutherland's philosophy of education and believed in it because it had the approval of the messenger of God, Ellen G. White. All through the years I watched with great interest the development of Madison.

The years 1947 to 1950 it was my privilege to become a part of Madison as director of the elementary educational program. I imbibed the Madison spirit, but circumstances prevented me from continuing. In 1959 I returned to the area to retire. After another eleven years, six of which were associated with the hospital and the school, circumstances took me to a retirement village near Portland, Ore. where I lived nine years until August, 1980. During a vacation I was injured in a car accident which further crippled me more than the hip injury of 1967 while on a tour in Europe, from which I never fully recovered and eventually was left a permanent cripple. . . .

The spirit of Madison never dies.... To keep in touch with former students from either era of my stay at Madison as well as with many hospital patients and employees during the years I was hostess of the hospital has been a wonderful privilege and continues to be.

Presently I am located at Loma Linda, CA. (25276 Barton Road, Apt. 17, 92354). My general health is excellent. No aging ailments plague me but inability to get about independently places me "on the shelf."

I continue to love the spirit, the goals, the plan of old Madison, and nothing would please me more now than to be associated in some way with a Madison unit.

I think I wrote you I had my left leg

amputated below the knee. I burned the left foot while riding a power machine cutting grass at the Maricopa Indian Mission. Of the four lesions, only one resisted treatment and finally broke down and became gangrenous, and I had to undergo surgery Oct. 16, 1980. I am getting along very well with a cane and a limb.

We pay a fee and get a 13x19 foot room, bath, small refrigerator and electric stove top. We are upstairs and have a small balcony. Moving from a nine-room mobile home 24 X 60 into a single room takes some adjustment but we are adjusting slowly. Our meals, room care and free laundry room are also furnished. You can furnish your room--if you can shrink or give away enough to be comfortable in a strait-jacket space.

Elder Felix Lorenz, who taught our Bible class at Madison is here with his wife, also the Albert Kepharts.

Eula is getting rested and free of housekeeping and cooking. We have hopes that she will recover. We do hope this will bring you up to date on "the silent Hills."

Elder Stanley Harris '37, Ceres, CA.

(Our alumni committee met last fall and selected names as possible speakers. We had been trying for several years to get Elder Stanley Harris '37 to come. Although "retired" from a heavy program of evangelism he has been called time and time again for a crusade, and found that he could not come. Drastic Postal Increases

The sudden, skyrocketing increase in all classes of postal rates beginning in 1982 has been a cause of concern for editors and publishers. In the early sixties when I became editor of THE MADISON SURVEY we could send about 8 SURVEYS for a penny. A little later it was 5 for a penny. On and on,up and up, went the cost of various classes of mail. But the recent stiff increase was a real blow. When we mailed the March SURVEY, about 1300 copies, it cost \$83.46, or about 6½ cents a copy (for a 10 page issue).

This is just one item of cost and does not include the paper, the printing, and other costs. We are thankful for our second class permit, long standing for many years.

- Changes of address are also costly so help us by sending in your new address in good time. We often have SURVEYS returned by the post office when there is no clue as to the new address; and we have to pay 25¢ for each one.
- It is a difficult task to take care of the mailing list, and we may slip up from time to time, even though we try hard. As you see former students, and classmates, please ask them if they are getting the MADISON SURVEY. This may be helpful in more ways than one. And take note of the date by your name on the back page.
