Early "Graduates" or "Finishers"

In delving into the early history of Madison, especially in connection with work on the new Madison book, increasing interest was engendered in the very earliest students who came here. In Sandborn's *History of Madison College* we found a list of so-called graduates by years. The first graduate was listed as Bertha Shilling in 1914 (She later married Royal Leslie).

Sometime during the 60's this editor did a little research on these early "graduates," when the nursing course was only one year and corresponded with George McClure and others. As I recall, McClure wrote that perhaps they should be called "finishers" of the one year course, rather than graduates.

Richard Glatter and Lenora Staples Earliest Nursing Students

Ethelwyn Glatter Boskind of Alejuela, Costa Rica, saw our appeal for names and pictures in connection with the new Madison book. She said she was sure there was a class of some kind in 1911-1912, and gave the names of her parents (Lenora Staples and Richard Glatter) who were students from South Africa at Madison in 1910-1911.

Pearl West, a graduate of Union College, went to South Africa as a teacher in 1900. One of her students was Lenore Glatter who came to America and Madison through Pearl's influence. Pearl married Beaden Mulfud and they started the Fountain Head unit which later was called Highland Academy and Sanitarium.

At Madison Lenore Staples met a young man by the name of Richard Glatter and they were married. Their daughter Ethelwyn ("Wyn") later was a student at Madison and here met her future husband, Sidney Milton Boskind ("Sid"), whose parents were also from South Africa, and they married. They were at Madison from 1933-36. They had 3 sons — Richard, Andrew, and Christopher. Andrew is a surgeon at Madison Hospital.

Son Richard M. Boskind is in business in Melbourne, FL., and son Christopher F. Boskind is a vice-president of L.L.U. Medical Center.

• We wish we could quote all of Mother Boskind's most interesting letter. Circumstances prevented "Wyn" and "Sid" Boskind from returning to Madison for further education, but she retained her love for old Madison, and wished her sons could have come here to school, but it did not work out. The elder Boskinds do come from Costa Rica to visit their son Andy and family. Dr. Andrew Boskind and wife Helen are active in the Madison Campus Church and hold responsible positions.

Academy of Horticultural Sciences

We noticed an intriguing title among the list of new ASI members — Academy of Horticultural Sciences at Moab, Utah, and wrote for further information. President of the academy is Russell Jones, and his wife Louise is secretary-treasurer. Their aim is to balance the curriculum with an academic, vocational, and spiritual program.

In 1984 the academy conducted a demonstration on a one third acre plot, using the organic method. From that third acre 14.000 pounds (7 tons) were harvested. They sold \$2,766 worth of vegetables and melons.

Russell James, president of the school, is the developer and originator of a special popcorn, "Pop-N-Eat-Um" holding the only patent on commercial popcorn in America. Send for price list. The plan is to develop and train farm managers — certainly this would help fill a great need in our denomination, both here and abroad.

Munroe got his M.D. at C.M.E. and set up practice in Oregon. He retired five years ago at Coquille, OR. He has been active in the Coquille Health Department as physiciancoroner and mental health consultant.

The Munroes have three children. Daughter Marilyn Badzik is a nurse and her husband is a dentist. Cheryl obtained her degree in Physical Therapy at W.W.C. Her husband Ron Schaffner, is a lawyer. (Why did the Layman Foundation move its headquarters from Madison to Ooltewah? We asked Norman Peek, executive secretary of T.L.F. to explain, and this is what he said.)

The Layman Foundation, founded in the interest of rural education and medical centers in the rural South by E. A. Sutherland. Lida Funk Scott, M. Bessie DeGraw, and others, has occupied the Scott House on the campus of Madison College since the death of Lida Scott in 1945. Because of the closing of Madison College, and the steady shifting of S.D.A. population from the Nashville area, The Layman Foundation considered several possibilities in the choice of a location for its office. . . After consideration of several factors it was decided to locate in the Collegedale area, but independent of the campus of Southern College.

Upon learning that the Post Office in Ooltewah would be moved, the old facility was purchased.... The new office is on the corner of Main Street (Ooltewah-Ringgold Road) and Ocoee Street, with the new Post Office just behind us. The new location is less than two miles from Southern College and less than two miles of the Interstate 75-Ooltewah exit. The new address is P.O. Box 747. Ooltewah, Tennessee 37363, and the telephone number is 615-238-5537. If you cannot reach anyone at this number, the home number of Norman Peek. the executive secretary, is 615-396-2765.

The institutions presently affiliated with The Layman Foundation are Fletcher Academy, Inc., Fletcher, N.C.; Pine Forest Sanitarium and Academy, Chunky, MS; Laurelbrook Sanitarium and Academy, Dayton, TN; Little Creek Sanitarium and Academy, Knoxville, TN: Harbert Hills Academy, Savannah, TN; Smithville Academy, Smithville, GA; Pine Hill Sanitarium, Birmingham, AL; and Progresso Vocational and Health Institute, Belieze, Central America.

The present board is composed of: Roger F. Goodge, president; Herbert Coolidge, vice-president; Norman Peek, executive secretary; Ralph Davidson, treasurer; and Robert Zollinger.

ROBERTA (YATES) GILBERT


She married Stanley Pepper in 1924. He died in 1969 of a heart attack. They had four children: Clement, James, Marguerite (Benson) and Merrill.

"I am enclosing an obituary for my beloved mother. All that I am I owe to her. I feel blessed for having known her. Now after all those years of suffering, though cheerful, she is at peace."
