WHAT TO DO WITH LIBRARY BUILDING STONES?

Juanita (Standish) Gosse Answers The Challenge

Juanita Gosse is the daughter cf H. E. Standish, the Industrial Arts teacher at Madison. He and his wife (Edythe) came to Madison in 1922 and were here until 1937. Juanita was born here at Madison Hospital.

She shares in the great heartache at the loss of the stone buildings.

Juanita's dad supervised the construction of the stone buildings on campus.

She says it would be wonderful if the Library could be saved, but if that was impossible perhaps another suggestion could be carried out.

Juanita drew a picture for a sign, to be made out of the stones, and suggested that large weather proofed photographs be placed on the sign along with the dates erected and the architect's name.

[If space permited it would be a pleasure to print all the accomplishments of Mr. Standish, while Madison was his home. But we would like to mention just three of them. (1) He did the archways and stuccoing for the Sanitarium, (2) He made a brick oven for the bakery with a capacity of 200 loaves that held the heat for a week after the fire was removed, (3) and made the slender cement columns with wrought iron frames for the new Campus street lights near the Sanitarium. 
GROUNDBREAKING FOR NEW ACADEMY BUILDING

It was the depression years and I was very poor so I hitchhiked to Madison. Miss DeGraw saw me, said I could stay and I was put to work on the farm milking cows at 4 a.m., then attending classes with more work in the afternoon. I recall most vividly the Bible study group headed by R. B. King where we went out and held home Bible studies. The Cricket Club was part of the student activities. The chapel talks by Dr. Sutherland were inspiring, especially after we could get out and work in carpentry with Elder Straw

Toward the end of my three years of premed, Mr. Standish gave me a contract to lay a cement sidewalk at two cents a square foot and I was able to pay off my school debt.

Dr. Sutherland said we should get an education quickly and go into the self-supporting work which I knew well because my mother and father (Ed Graves) lived and helped the unit at Sand Mountain from 1910-1918.

Miss DeGraw gave a lot of us premed fellows an I.Q. test on all medical subjects and I didn't do so well, but she gave me some encouragement by saying, "Well, go ahead to Loma Linda and do the best you can. Sometimes the doctors who have a struggle out there make the best missionaries in the end."

Dr. Sutherland, Dr. Brailliar, Mr. Standish, Elder Straw along with the inspiration from Miss DeGraw and the Spanish that Mrs. King taught me had a very decided influence on my life.

Dale Putnam, Arthur Pearson, L. Ellenberger, David Johnson, myself, and others started out for Loma Linda. I was sick with

malaria and corneal ulcer of the right eye so I was feeling miserable on that trip.

After Rosa Lee (Gunderson) R.N. and I were married we started 22 years of self-supporting medical missionary work in Guatemala, Central America

About 1954, I was diagnosed as having cancer which was controlled by diet and home remedies. I learned much at the University of Brazil about the natural methods for the cure and prevention of cancer. At age 80, I thank God I am still able to garden and raise lots of fruits and vegetables to eat. Some wise man said: "Raise what you eat and eat what you raise. Your food is your medicine and your medicine should be your food."
