"If you have ever cleaned a flue out you have sweat, and have accumulated the dust of the furnace and if you can endure that together you'll be buddies; he said.

He also told how he and another student went to a golf tournament in Centennial Park on a Friday, "Keep in mind I was aware I shouldn't be out there. A photographer came along and took my picture because I came the closest to the hole, that day. I was fearful my picture would be in the paper. But the Lord must have had a hand in it because someone got closer than I did to the hole and my picture was not put in the paper. I have been thankful ever since.

I know Dr. E. A. Sutherland's principles and that he would not approve. He and I got to be close friends, and he has my great respect.

Before graduating from M. C. I went one year to Washington Missionary College and passed

my C.P.A. exam.

There the Randolphs built and settled into a comfortable home on five acres of land next door to the local Adventist Church, where he served as head elder. Not willing to retire completely, Dr. Randolph was house physician in the emergency room of Madison Hospital and saw patients at the nearby Hillhaven Convalescent Center.

He was an avid gardener and soon his place became a showpiece of fruit trees, grape vines and berries, which, together with other produce from his garden, he enjoyed sharing with his neighbors and friends. He became well known in the community, and was elected mayor of the City of Cross Plains, in which office he served with distinction.

He and his wife, Alberta, decided to slow down a bit and moved into Cumberland View Towers Retirement Center in Madison for a few years, then went to Loma Linda, CA, for a few years, and finally came back to Madison again.

Dr. Randolph is survived by his wife Alberta, one daughter and son-in-law, Beverly Anne and Dr. Paul Cutler of Toronto, Canada, and two grandchildren, Sean and Michelle.

Pastors F.H. Hewitt, Gordon Paxton, and Eugene Remmers officiated at the funeral. Interment was at Carr Cemetery in Cross Plains.

This brief sketch of a life so full of active and unselfish service to others hardly does justice to the record of this earnest servant of God. His sterling character, his honesty and integrity are beyond question. His keen, sharp mind, together with a simple, childlike faith, made him a unique person.

He was instrumental in organizing the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference Retirees Club, and served as one of its first presidents. He was a generous supporter of the church, and took a special interest in Madison Academy and Christian education for young people.

Among the survivors we might mention a nephew Other Eusey, owner of the Eusey Press in Leominster, MA., who reprinted thousands of E.A. Sutherland's book, *STUDIES IN CHRISTIAN EDUCATION*. This was a real service after this valuable book went out of print.

Lee Ellsworth Eusey was born Aug. 24, 1898 in Indianapolis, IN. He was the youngest of four children, the older being Muriel, Florence, and Merrit. When Lee was an infant his home was visited by an Adventist colporteur. The family purchased the book, *BIBLE READINGS FOR THE HOME CIRCLE*. This event led to evangelistic tent meetings, Bible studies and conversions of the family to the Sabbath truth.

The family then moved to a farm in Ohio near Millersburg. It was on this farm, among mostly Amish folk, that Lee spent his boyhood days.

After his graduation from Mt. Vernon Academy, in 1916 Lee went to Madison College to study premed. It was in his first year of study that his father was killed in a farm accident. Because his older brother and sisters were married and had homes of their own, Lee chose to put his studies on hold, return home to run the farm and care for his mother. There he served the community as school board chairman and was instrumental in the building of a new school building.

Later, upon the sale of the farm, Lee was able to continue his education at E.M.C. (now Andrews University). It was there he met Gladys Elizabeth (McCrillis). The following summer while she was playing the piano for a George Vanderman evangelistic effort they were married in the tent on Aug. 23, 1939. That fall they moved to Oak Park Academy, Iowa where he was the farm manager. It was here that their only child, Nancy Lee, was born. He served as farm manager and or teacher at Bethel Academy in Wisconsin, Shenandoah Valley Academy, Virginia, Atlantic Union College, Massachusetts, Blue Mt. Academy, Pennsylvania, and Madison College in Tennessee.

He had a love for knowledge, and books were some of his greatest friends. He loved to study the Bible and had an extensive library, of Ellen G. White's writings. His thesis on the Civil War as related to messages given to E.G. White is on file at Andrews University. He loved the Lord and the Adventist message and served as an elder, deacon, and Sabbath School teacher in the churches he attended.

His love for knowledge brought him back to Andrews University twice. He completed his Masters Degree in Agriculture at Michigan State University, and later at the age of 67 received a Masters Degree in History.

Upon retirement, Lee and Gladys built a home in Portland, TN., where they lived until his wife's death. Since then he has lived with his daughter, Nancy Lee Johnson, then into a rest home in Goodlettsville.
