Susan (Walen) Ard Laid to Rest

Susan Ard was born April 9, 1898 in Gloucester, MA and died quietly in her home at Chestnut Hill, Oak Grove, TN January 13, 1990, at age 91.

Susan moved with her family; dad Herman, mother Harriet and brother Earnest Walen, from St. Helena, CA to Madison College, in 1908. After three months training along with their friends the George Wallaces, they bought a 112 acre farm and moved to Oak Grove, TN. There they founded the second Madison "Unit", Chestnut Hill Farm School.

Susan began teaching when she was 12 years of age, under the supervision of her mother, and then had her lessons after school.

During these early years Herschel Ard came to Chestnut Hill to help teach school. He and Susan were married on Susan's 17th birthday, April 9, 1915.

In 1933, Susan graduated from Madison High School. In 1937, she graduated with a B.S. from Madison College.

Sometimes, when there were special cases of need with small children, the Walens and Ards would take them in. One such child was Sandra (Dorris) Davis, who lived at Chestnut Hill until she was five years old. After leaving Chestnut Hill, Sandra was in the care of

Yvonne (Rumley) Danner MR'63, who had been a teacher at Chestnut Hill. Sandra received her training at Madison and graduated from Medical Records in 1965.

At age 87, Susan reluctantly gave up driving. She will be genuinely missed.

(At the funeral, Dona Frazee assured the people, that she and her family would make sure that the work at Chestnut Hill would be continued in the Oak Grove community.)

TCMC

Since returning to Madison, I have had the opportunity to spend some time walking around the campus and the farm, observing first hand the many changes that have taken place since the Culpepper family first arrived from South Georgia in the mid 40's. Some of you may have made this same journey as you have come back to Madison from time to time.

There is little left of the original buildings on the medical center campus. A portion of North Hall is still standing and is used by Environmental Services at TCMC. This building has deteriorated significantly and is scheduled to be taken down as soon as a replacement building can be budgeted. Parkview is now used for financial, personnel, education, marketing and data processing services. This building has been rebuilt and changed through the years. Hankins Cottage still stands, but its deteriorated condition will mean it will come down soon. Otherwise, there are some original sidewalks and trees so with enough imagination you can place some of the original Sanitarium buildings.

One concern that is often expressed to me here, as well as other Adventist hospitals where I have worked, has to do with the number of Adventist staff members. At TCMC, we have 27 Adventist physicians on the Active or Courtesy staff. The majority of our Department Managers are Seventhday Adventists as well as a large percentage of our employees, larger than most Adventist hospitals. We also have a number of non-Adventist Christian physicians, department managers and employees who are committed to our mission and objectives as an Adventist hospital.

We have a growing Rehabilitation program directed by Dr. Trevor Paris, who is a physiatrist trained at Loma Linda and who is committed to Adventist health care. The administrative director of our Rehabilitation program is Larry Crissup, an SDA from Reading Rehab Hospital in Pennsylvania. We have a busy physical therapy department as well as speech therapy and occupational therapy who offer support services to our 30-bed inpatient rehabilitation unit and active outpatient program.

While many things have changed and just a few buildings remain, our mission of Christian health care ministry continues amid very challenging times for Adventist hospitals everywhere.

MEMORIES

Myrtle M. (West) Fuller'25
Ooltewah, TN

You may know my sister, Lila Lundquist, at Portland, TN. Our parents, Forrest and Lulu (Mulford) West, and Uncle Braden and Aunt Pearl Mulford started the Fountain Head school, (now Highland Academy), in 1906. I was six years old at the time. My dad chartered a freight car loaded with all our house hold and farm possessions, including stock and chickens. He rode in the train car. fed and watered the animals, then hitched the horses to the wagons, and took everything to the farm and unloaded them.

One of my jobs at Fountain Head was to clean lamp chimnies, as it was over 21 years before electricity.

I came to Madison when I was 18 years of age, in 1918. My first job was in the milk house, caring for the milk as it came to me in tall cans. I strained it, and put it in other large milk cans for the Sanitarium dining room. It was put in a large water tank for cooling. Everything in the creamery had to be kept spotlessley clean, morning and night. I was happy as long as there was something to do.

I just had my 89th birthday. I am so glad Dr. Sutherland stressed the practical side of life as doing our very best and learn all we could about the work in all lines of duty. I have loved work all my life, but as soon as the Madison Sanitarium was opened I learned that was one place I could not work. The patient swere young, some 11 and 12 years old. Tears came to my eyes every time I entered the building. I could not be near the sick and suffering so, I worked outside pulling weeds, hoeing, and splitting wood for the kitchen range.

The flu of 1918 took many lives. That was during the war. The powder plant across the river called for nurses, as there were too many sick at the plant to be cared for, and many bodies were taken in wagons to undertakers. They had no cas

kets for them toward the last. When two of our students died from the flu and I had a fever, my parents came and took me home.

One of the things I learned at Madison was how to mend clothes, and I was very good at it. Many people over the years have brought clothes for me to mend.

I have wanted to attend the conventions (Homecoming) but only got to two of them.

Mrs. E.R. Moore, Supt. of nurses at Madison S-H, was an inspiration as well as a friend. In August 1938 she taught a dozen of us women "Battle Creek treatments" on condition we work in Hydro from seven a.m. until noon, six days a week, for the following year. This was a wonderful experience, and led me to acquiring my RN at Wm. Mason Mem. Hospital in 1944, and my RPTT at Loma Linda in 1945. Also, it helped lead to marrying Otto Pietz at Madison, March 20, 1948.
