Dr. E. A. Sutherland Speaks

The only thing I could do was to go to old professor Bell, who was the founder of our education system, and take a course in rhetoric and English Literature. I'll not tell you about that, but I had a remarkable experience with that old gentleman. He finally regretted very much because I didn't stay with him longer. I had him as a private tutor and the remark that he made, "I wish I could keep you with me long enough to toll (entice, decoy or draw) you off." That meant that he felt as though I was still rather fresh in English, and I found out that he was right. He had a great influence on my life and was a great teacher.

Then I went back to Iowa and I taught three years in the public schools. Then again, I was stirred up to take the medical course. And I made another attempt, but for some reason or another, as old professor Prescott used to say, "The clock hadn't struck the time yet," and so I couldn't get into it at that time. That was about five years later. Finally things opened so I could go to the Battle Creek College and take a regular course, and did. Then I had been chosen with others to fill departments in the Union College, which was started. My department

was history. I specialized on that, took some post graduate work, did all that I could to prepare myself for it. Just two weeks before the opening of the Union college, at Lincoln, I was called in by the secretary of education. He said that

the teacher in Bible had failed up at Battle Creek College and that they had decided that I should take the Bible department. I said, "Professor, I am not prepared for that." I hadn't done any special work along that line. And he said, "We feel as though that you're the best one we can find at the present, and we want you to take it." He didn't give me much choice; he said, "You'd better take it." Because I wasn't old enough to have much to say about what I should do in education, I was obliged to take that particular position, but I did say to him, "Now what are you going to do with me if I should get off the theological track?" "Well," he said, "We'll take our chances on you." I said, "I've taken all the Bible that they've taught in Battle Creek College, but I'm not sure of myself." But he said, "That's where we want you to go."

So I started in with the Old Testament Bible and it was a new experience. I had 80 students. One thing, I promised the Lord that whenever I found anything in the Bible I would try to teach it by living it myself, so that I would have something to back up my teaching. The first thing that we struck that really upset us was in the first

chapter of Genesis, where man was put on a diet. There I was, a new green teacher trying to teach the Bible. We all had taken sort of a vow that whatever we read in the Bible we'd practice. Well we talked about it, we didn't practice it, because the school was serving meat three times a day and we didn't feel as though we were far enough along in our Bible to start any kind of reform, but we struck it again in the 9th chapter of Genesis, that man's life was shortened if he was permitted to have meat--he wouldn't live as long. That started the same thing again. A few of us got quite stirred up, and when we landed in Exodus where the Lord was taking the children of Israel out of Egypt over

into the promised land and put them on a non-flesh diet, things broke loose in the Battle Creek College. Out of those 80 students, there were 50 that wanted beans and lentils in the place of meat. They asked for something with some protein in it, and it happened that the matron was the sister of the president of the school. And we struck a snag, I want to tell you, not only with the matron, but with the president. The president of the board was a man who never had reached the point where he could get along without his meat, although he was a famous Seventhday-Adventist and they called the board.

Professor Prescott talked to me, and said I ought not to teach those things. But I said, "You know the understanding was that you would let me have my way to teach what the Bible taught. I said, "it's there and it's in the Spirit of Prophecy." "Well," he said, "you ought not to get out of the beaten track." But I said, "You're just the two of you and you are a little too late. I'm already off the track and I can't get back on the track that you want me to get on and I'll have to go this way."

Well, it resulted in a board meeting and I was told not to teach that anymore. Things began to work like yeast and it wasn't but a little while, even though I didn't teach it, because it didn't strike any new place in the Bible, you understand, all I was teaching was the Bible. One hundred and fifty students signed a petition that they wanted something besides meat and we got it. We had quite a reform there. This lead to a very serious consideration about my position in the school. To be continued.

We all treasure our heritage, whether it is our family, our church, or maybe the organization we work for.

At TCMC, we have a monthly program we call Loaves and Fishes. Employees are invited to enjoy some food and drink during the noon hour and have a spiritual treat as well, by a different department of the hospital each month.

Recently, our chaplain, Colin Morris, had the program and he chose to share with our employees the heritage of Tennessee Christian Medical Center-Madison Rural Sanitarium/Madison College.

We heard the familiar story of the river boat "Morning Star" breaking down on the river near the Ferguson-Jenkins farm and Mrs. White telling these two educators that "this is the place."

Chaplain Morris told about the beginnings of health care in 1907, through the years until our two educators decided to become physicians, riding their motorcycles back and forth to Vanderbilt Medical School, while carrying full school responsibilities.

In this interview, we learned about the difficulties and hardships through the years, as well as the successes.

There were 150 employees of TCMC who now have a greater appreciation of the Adventist church and its hospital by attending Loaves and Fishes.
