Dr. E.A. Sutherland SPEAKS

Continued from March 1991 SURVEY

In three months we loaded 16 cars of the personal property of the college, even the old college bell, took it down to Berrien Springs. If we hadn't moved out quickly we never would have gotten out because there was a tremendous reaction later on. And I want to say this to you young people, when the Spirit of God tells you to do a thing, do it then. When? All together, do it then. If you don't, you know who is going to get on your track and make it hard for you later on. He's right after everybody as a procrastinator. So we got out of Battle Creek College and down to Berrien Springs. I'll not tell you anything about it down there, but Magan and I worked there for several years and we got into trouble again.

This time we were shoved out of Berrien Springs, down into the deep South. And you know the South was a hard place to go. Many a person, an Adventist, would rather go across the ocean, you understand, and smell the salt air, than to go south. That was the last place where a person would be sent that wasn't in very good favor. They sent him down south and that was supposed to be sort of a punishment to him, you understand, make him behave himself. So we were sent down south, not by the General Conference, but by the Lord. Sister White was there at Berrien Springs when this thing took place. She

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Laymen's Extention League

Fletcher Academy hosted the 81st convention of the Laymen's Extension League Sept. 26-28. There were about 50 representatives from 12 self-supporting institutions.

Elder Jack Williams spoke on Friday. He divided all self-supporting work into 2 categories, individual and institutional. He said, "Individual work should be totally self-supporting; institutional work should be allowed to solicit funds for items that could not be considered ordinary operating expenses. All self-supporting work should be careful of its attitude towards the conference, avoiding divisive actions or attitudes."

Chris Tucker held the 2nd meeting on Friday. He dealt with Christian business principles. "A Christian businessman should sell his product at a fair price and should pay his bills on time, never using credit when he knows he cannot repay."

Sabbath afternoon, Robert Zollinger, president of both Laurelbrook and the Layman Foundation, explained that the Layman foundation was formed to assist educational institutions started by Madison alumni and to administer funds donated by Lida Funk Scott and others. The LEL was organized as an annual convention of Southern Self-Supporting Workers in 1910 to cherish and preserve the principles of self-supporting work as given to Madison and the "Units" through the Spirit of Prophecy, to encourage

KIDNAPPED

Ron Wyatt, a member of the Madison campus SDA church, who was kidnapped by Kurdish rebels as he worked on a proposed Noah's Ark film project in Turkey has been released. His release was skillfully effected by the Turkish police.

Ron has been traveling to Mount Ararat in Turkey since 1977 because he believes that a boat-shaped 515-foot-long mound there entombs Noah's Ark. He was in Turkey to arrange a preliminary excavation on the site in preparation for a documentary to be filmed.

Ron said, "It was a nightmare experience. We traveled at night on foot constantly and slept during the day. Our lives were threatened and it was a dangerous situation."

The PKK--Kurdish Labor Party--who kidnapped Ron and his party has been fighting a guerrilla war for independence since 1984. They insist that foreign travelers in southeastern Turkey obtain "passes" from its offices in Europe.

Ron took anesthesia under Bernard Bowen at Madison Hospital in the early 60's.

went down with us. Three nights we were on a boat, looking for a place for the colored people. Three different nights Sister White was impressed by the Lord that we should locate there. Three different mornings Sister White called Magan and myself to her room on that boat and told us that the Lord had revealed to her that we should buy a certain place that she had looked at after the boat broke down. The boat broke down after we had been running for about three hours from Nashville. W. Palmer took her off and she saw a farm she said the Lord told her that was the farm that we should get. Well, Magan and I had no more idea of starting a school down there near Nashville, the Athens of the South, than you have of being the president of the American Medical Association, you understand. You may be sometime, but I hope you're not thinking about it right now. We were not, we said we can't do it Sister White, it's impossible. She finally brought us to the place where we had to decide. She told us that that was the place to start a training school. We didn't feel as though we were capable of doing anything of that kind. Finally she ordered the boat to turn around and go back again to Nashville. She got off of the boat and got a carriage and went over and looked at this farm, and came back and said it was a wonderful and beautiful farm. Magan and I were sulking. We wouldn't even go look at the farm. Now I'd just like to confess, we were that kind of men who hadn't reached that second conversion, you understand. So she came back and told us it was a beautiful place and she knew that was where the Lord wanted us to start this training school.

Well, after while, before night, Magan and I got a rig and we went over and looked at it and if we ever saw a tough, hard-looking farm, the farm that she said was a beautiful farm looked to us that way. As we

approached the farm, we were impressed with the number of rats that ran around on the road. The barn was in front of the house. It was an old plantation house, and it was the most forbidding looking place I believe I had ever seen, or ever thought I would have anything to do with. Again, we were faced with this thing. Three different times, we were called in the morning by Sarah Macinturfer to hear Sister White say that that was the place. We went over and looked at it and we felt as though it was too much for us.

We sat down on some stones and then we talked to each other and we said, now, we're brought to the place where we've got to decide what our real belief is in the Spirit of Prophecy what our attitude is going to be toward the Spirit of Prophecy. We could see that some men felt that Sister White many times was under the influence of individuals and would only give what somebody had put in her mind, and that it was only human information; or people who felt that when Sister White said the Lord told her these things were so, they believed that the Spirit of God impressed her mind and told her to give that truth. Now, we said, we see Elder Jones, we see Elder Wagoner, we see Dr. Kellogg, and many others that have taken the road that do not accept the Spirit of Prophecy unless it agrees with their own minds. We said, we've always felt that we could trust the Spirit of Prophecy, now what are we going to do about it? Magan cried like a child, I was with Magan when he first started out, he was three years younger than I, and we had a lot of experience together. He was very very much upset. And I cried a little.
