DR. E.A. SUTHERLAND SPEAKS

It was harder for me to cry than it was for Magan, but I cried just the same. And after we cried we prayed and we shook hands and we said there is no other way for us to go than the way that Sister White has told us that the Lord wanted us to go and we're gonna take our stand and go that way whatever may come and we did. We got up from those stones and walked up to the house and found out what the place would cost and took an option on it. One hundred dollars, and Magan and I had just about a hundred dollars, and we put it down and wrote out an option and Magan was to stay and take an inventory and I took the train that night to go up and raise \$5,000. We had to pay \$5,000 payment in about 30 days. That is the way we left. And we went back and told Sister White, what we had done. She was very, very happy and so grateful that we would get that place. And she told us, that if you do all you can, the Lord will put it into the hearts of the people to help you. And I want to say after all these years, I never have seen one single evidence that prophecy was not fulfilled. Because we started out without anything, and as fast as we could use money, it came to us in one way or another. We had to work hard. It took all of the wisdom and all of the ability and all of the activity that we were able to put forth to bring it about. But the Lord never

failed and Sister White's statement was absolutely true. And Madison was the only board that Sister White ever served on. She stayed on that board until she died in 1915. And she was intensely interested in that thing.

Now we were obliged to start out without anything, a training school. We were in bad order in the denomination. We were looked upon as, well they didn't know whether we were Kellogites or Jonesites or what kind of a ite we were, but they knew we were not orthodox. And we had to prove that we were. And so we started to build and one of the things that came to us, was that we should have a sanitarium because at Berrien Springs we arranged for a medical work, sanitarium, to be carried on with the regular college work. And so we planned to do the same down there. We put up a sanitarium building. Twelve rooms for patients, with the things that go with it. We had to use wood stoves.

KIDS LINE

A year ago, TCMC began an innovative community outreach service called KidsLine, a confidential after-school telephone support line for children who are home alone. Staffed by trained volunteers, the service is available weekdays from 2-6pm during the summer months and 3-6pm during the school year.

Most calls come from kids who are lonely, bored or eager to share good news. Although very few calls turn out to be emergencies, the capability exists for the volunteers at KidsLine to connect three-way calling with emergency resources and parents, if the need arises.

The callers range in age from 4-18, but the majority of the kids are 10-11.

The program's goal is to help children help themselves.

MAN'S WEEDS GOD'S MEDICINE

Never before has humanity had such an effective arsenal of drugs against pain. These drugs have serious drawbacks when used over long periods or in high doses, however, herbal formulas can make effective alternatives.

The FDA has estimated that nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drug use such as (aspirin, aspirin-free Anacin, Excedrin, Tylenol, Ibuprofen, Advil, Motrin), etc. leads to 20-30,000 cases of gastrointestinal bleeding each year, resulting in 10-20,000 deaths.

In prescription-level doses of Ibuprofen 1 in 6 patients may have kidney failure. The National Kidney Foundation has petitioned the FDA to have warnings about possible kidney damage placed on all ibuprofen packages.

Long-term acetaminophen use has been implicated in liver disease.

Herbal formulas have actions that are broader than those of drugs. This is especially useful in chronic pain, universally complicated by other problems such as insomnia, anxiety, depression, fatigue, or irritability.

Here are 8 herbs that may help your pain. Do not take if you are pregnant.

Willow Bark--contains aspirin-like compounds, but will not irritate the digestive tract.

Meadow Sweet--has anti-inflammatory components slightly different from willow bark. The name aspirin was derived from spiraein found in meadow sweet.

Valerian--is a sedative with analgesic antispasmodic properties. Good for pain that causes insomnia. 1/2 to 2 tsp. per dose.

Passion Flower--is a gentle sedative well-suited to insomnia accompanying pain in children or the elderly. (May also be helpful in muscle spasms.)

Wild Yam--is antispasmodic and anti-inflammatory. It may be helpful in neuralgia and spasms of the

gallbladder and uterus.

Black Cohosh--was used by Native Americans for menstrual pain and the pain of arthritis.

Cramp Bark & Black Haw--may be used interchangeably. Especially useful for spasmodic pain, i.e. lower back and legs. Also for menstrual cramps.

St. Johnswort--is specifically for nerve damage pain. Also it is a mild sedative and antidepressant.

You can take these 8 herbs by themself or combine them according to your need.

*An excellent pain poultice is: one blended grapefruit and 1/2 cup epsom salt simmered for 1/2 hour.

Oat straw can be simmered into a strong tea and applied as a fomentation to kill pain.
