I wish to thank all those who so generously participated in providing a fund for my discretionary use for educational projects within this division. I used \$500 to purchase a Fax machine because my communications from the General Conference were getting to me as much as 2 weeks late and sometimes after the fact.

The Ryzan school had nothing in the way of school supplies. They had taken a material very much like Masonite and painted it a brown color and used it as a chalkboard, and it just wasn't working. The people said that chalkboards were 12,000 rubles each. That was about \$40 per framed board ready to be hung on the wall. We had 7 teachers come with us to the school supply store. We purchased 5 chalkboards, maps, globes, scientific equipment and all kinds of things which they needed. It all came to about \$210.

When we got back to the school it was like Christmas. I never saw adults and children so excited about school supplies. I told the principal to use the remainder of the \$300 within the school as she saw fit. She thanked me with tears in her eyes.

We have 3 schools in operation. One of those has 13 teachers, but only 3 are SDA. Elder Ted Wilson, our new division president, said "If you don't have Adventist teachers, don't open a school." So, we do not consider that they are part of our system and they will receive no financial help. We also have several

Alternative Schools. These schools have their students meet on weekends and/or evenings for Bible courses. We have translated the Bible lessons, which are used in the U.S., for grades 1-4. We are also using these Bible books in several public schools which have Adventist principals and teachers. There is a great need to teach religion in the public schools and we need all our Bible textbooks translated and printed in the Russian language.

Our itinerary is really crowded for the first half of this year as we visit all the places which have requested our help in organizing these schools. We will be flying to Habarsk, on the Pacific coast. This location is east of north China. From there it is closer to the western shore of the U.S. than it is back to Moscow, eleven time zones to the west.

In 1992 there were 187 evangelistic crusades held in this division. More than 200 are planned for 1993.

People are coming into the church by the thousands.

People are having a difficult time economically. One of our pastors lives with his family in a 1 room apt., and has to use the bathroom and phone with 3 other families. Many say that under the communistic regime things were more stable and commodities and goods were cheaper. When we came the ruble was selling at about 150 to the dollar. At the time of this writing it is selling 420 to the dollar. We do not know how far this will go.

SOYBEAN HISTORY *Continued*

ten by William Shurtleff, which was published in a supplement to the *Natural Foods Merchandiser* in Nov. 1991.

Tofu was introduced to America by Benjamin Franklin, who was among the first people in America to practice vegetarianism. By the 1920's, tofu was being made by many Seventh-day Adventists, who are vegetarians.

Two early soyfoods pioneers were T.A. VanGundy and *Madison College*, a self-supporting SDA college in Madison, TN, which taught that work and learning were connected.

Perhaps no greater admiration for the soy bean could be found in anyone than in Henry Ford. He assembled a team of researchers who developed products that ranged from a soybean wool used to stuff car seats, and make clothing to soy-based foods such as ice cream.

Ford raised eyebrows by serving a 12 course meal made entirely of soy foods at the 1934 Century of Progress World's Fair in Chicago. He regularly wore a suit and necktie made of soybean wool, and in 1941, *Time* published a photograph showing the automaker using an axe to demonstrate that a car made of a plastic-like soybean protein compound, created by his researchers, was highly resistant to dents. Surtleff says, "Soyfoods consumption was generally limited to Asian Americans and Seventh-day Adventists until the mid-1960's."

New Year's Day '92 we were watching the very rare Ivory Gull in Chicago, and a few days later we were driving through a blinding blizzard on the slopes of Mt. Shasta in northern CA on the way to the Klamath basin near Klamath Falls, OR, to see a lost Whooper Swan. After a few days of work in southern CA, we drove to the Columbia River gorge to see a male Smew. Then in late Jan. we went to Duluth, MN to see the Great Gray Owl. Those owls were worth the drive but we also saw the Northern Hawk-Owls, Snowy Owls, a Gyrfalcon, and assorted winter finches including Common Redpolls. The Great Gray was my husband, John's 700th ABA-area bird. So in January '92 we drove more than 11,000 miles.

In June '92 we flew to almost all the corners of Alaska, in the pursuit of birds. We saw a Bean Goose, a male-Spectacled Eider a threatened species, and a close up look at a squealing Brown Lemming. We saw all our target birds and many, many more. We also saw a mother Grizzly with 2 cubs right alongside the road.

After 14 flights in Alaska, we returned to Ohio, and then flew to Churchill, Manitoba, Canada to see the very rare Ross' Gull. We celebrated July 4th by going to the Churchill River and watching one of the most prolonged and spectacular sunsets take place over the icebergs

on the river and bay. The weather at Churchill seemed to be a month behind what it normally is, and there were huge icebergs choking the river mouth with a great sheet of ice covering the Hudson Bay. During our stay the Beluga Whales began to swim into the river to feed. What a sight!

In August '92 we were off via Boston to Quebec City, and then drove to Perce and Bonaventure Island. French Canada is very beautiful and romantic. We estimate that we saw 2/3 of the 60,000 Northern Gannets on the backside of Bonaventure Island, where at times they actually walk around a person's feet. A highlight of the trip was a look at the rare Fisher, a member of the weasel family, as it crossed the road in front of us. We literally ran up Mt. Jacques Cartier in Parc de la Gaspie, and saw the Woodland Caribou, completing the set of all three of North America's caribou in one year.

We went other places than the north such as Florida where we missed seeing the Stripe-headed Tanager, Amarillo Tx, to see the Lesser Prairie-Chicken, and to Arizona, Maryland, and California, 4 times. We went sea birding to help John work on trying to keep from getting seasick (the 'patches' really work). We visited 24 states and 3 Canadian provinces, with over 500 species in the ABA area in one year. We also keep a mammal list and we both went over 100 species in the ABA.

John worked as regional editor on a revision of Tom Thomson's book on birding in the state of Ohio, so we saw a lot of Ohio, also.

In between trips we tended to a new herb garden in our front yard which produced sage that was taller than me.

God has caused to grow out of the ground **HERBS** for the use of man and if we understand the nature of these roots and **HERBS**, and make a right use of them...people would be in much better health than they are today." Letter 35, 1890.

"There are **simple HERBS** and roots that every family may use for themselves...." Letter 17a, 1893.

"Hop tea will induce sleep. Hop poultices over the stomach will relieve pain. When the head is congested, if the feet and limbs are put in a bath with a little mustard, relief will be obtained. There are many more simple remedies which will do much to restore healthful action to the body. **All these simple preparations the Lord expects us to use for ourselves; but man's extremities are God's opportunities.**

"If we neglect to do that which is within the reach of nearly every family, and ask the Lord to relieve pain, when we are to indolent to make use of these remedies within our power, it is simply presumption.

"The Lord has given some **simple HERBS** of the field that at times are beneficial; and if every family were educated in how to use these **herbs** in case of sickness, much suffering might be pre-vented...These old fashioned, **simple HERBS**, used intelligently, would have recovered many sick...." Letter 82, 1897.

"There are many ways of practicing the healing art; but there is only one way that Heaven approves. God's remedies are the simple agencies of nature....Pure air and water, cleanliness, a proper diet, purity of life, and a firm trust in God, are remedies for the want of which thousands are dying... Fresh air, exercise, pure water, and clean sweet premises, are within the reach of all." 5 T 443.

"Always study and teach the use of the simplest remedies, and the

special blessing of the Lord may be expected to follow the use of these means which are within the reach of the common people." Ltr. 100, 1903.

"Light was given that there is health in the fragrance of the pine, the cedar, and the fir. And there are several other kinds of trees that have medicinal properties that are health promoting." Ltr. 95, 1902

"The truth for this time, the 3rd angel's message, is to be proclaimed with a loud voice as we approach the great final test. **This test must come to the churches in connection with true medical missionary work.**

"When the Lord told Hezekiah that He would spare his life for 15 years, and as a sign that He would fulfill His promise, caused the sun to go back 10 degrees, why did He not put His direct, restoring power upon the King? He told him to apply a bunch of figs to his sore, and that natural remedy, blessed by God, healed him. **The God of nature directs the human agent to use natural remedies now.**" Letter, 1899.

The Lord has provided antidotes for disease in **simple plants**, and these can be used by faith; for by using the blessings provided by God for our benefit we are cooperating with Him. We can use water and sunshine and the **HERBS** which He has caused to grow for healing maladies brought on by indiscretion or accident." MS 65, 1899,

We are told that in the time of trouble "there will be sick ones, plenty of them, that will need help" so because of the need, but also "for their own sake, they should, while they have opportunity, become intelligent in regard to disease, its causes, prevention and cure, and those who will do this will find a field of labor anywhere." CH 506

Funds are needed in addition to the \$102,000 so far received for this most worthy project. Please send to:

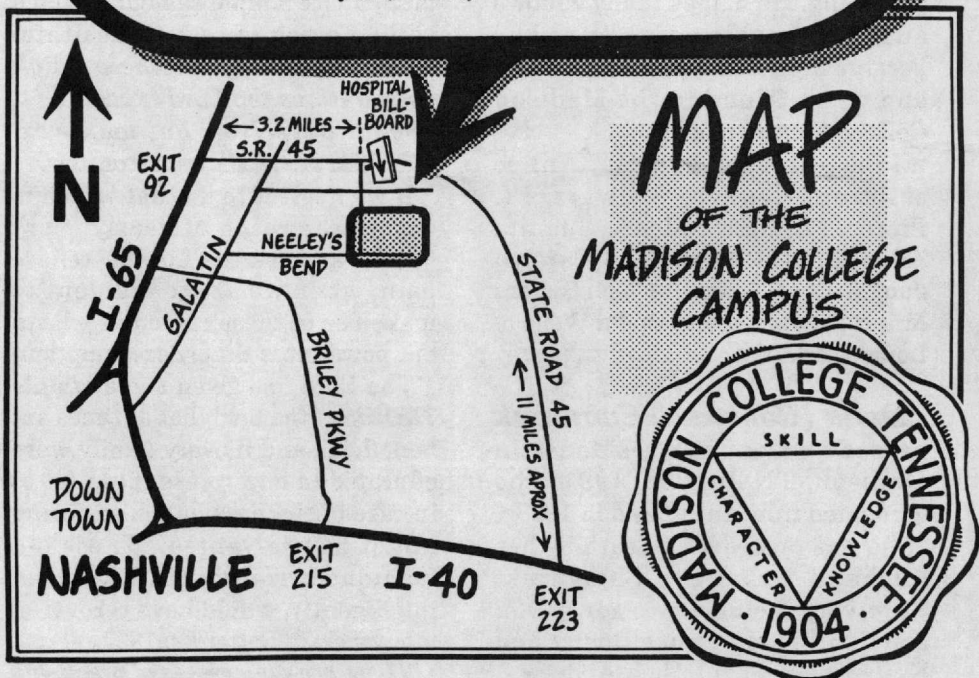
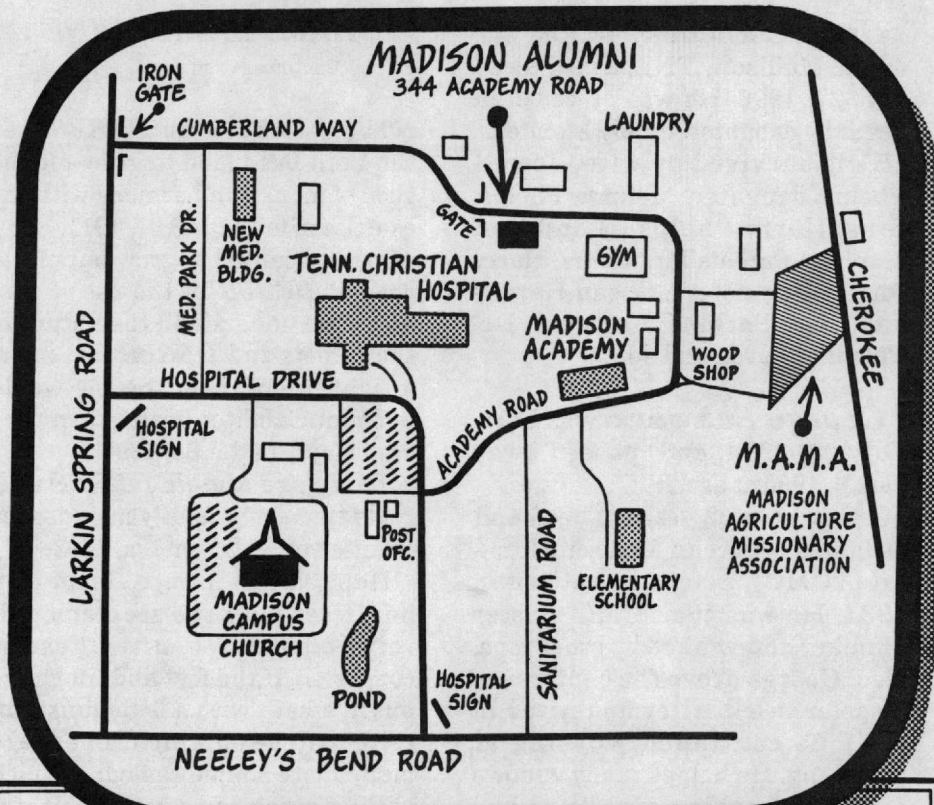
