Letters between Floyd Bralliar and Eleanor Roosevelt Part 2

(Note: Two of the Madison pioneers— Bessie DeGraw and Floyd Bralliar—had the gift of public relations. Both wrote a lot about the school for Adventist publications, and the news media. One of

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Dr. Bralliar's readers, Secretary of State Cordell Hull, put him in contact with Eleanor Roosevelt. Their correspondence is on file at the Franklin Roosevelt Presidential Library in Hyde Park, N.Y. The following article completes the story of their correspondence. Dr. Bralliar was leading a fund raising campaign to raise money for a new dormitory on campus due to a swelling enrollment.)

"I think you will be interested to know what progress Madison College is making," he wrote to her on Dec. 6, 1939. "By continued effort, little by little, we succeeded in getting together enough money to complete the program I talked with you about when you were in Nashville. We paid for doubling the size of the chapel and refurnishing it. We built and paid for a new men's bathroom with plenty of showers and toilet facilities to take care of all the men who live in cottages where there are no such facilities. We completed the dormitory for 50. As a matter of fact it accommodates only 46 girls.

"However, publicity continues and the pressure of would-be students has also continued. When I talked with you we had over 300 students in the school. I was told, a week ago, by Mr. Welch who is acting Dean while I am engaged in raising funds, that we now have 467 students, all of whom are earning all or the larger part of their school expenses by labor. Our faculty homes are even more crowded than they were a year ago. At present Mrs. Bralliar and I have nine students.

"Because of this pressure, after teaching a quarter, I started a campaign to get money for a new dormitory that will contain not only rooms for 95 girls and an apartment for a hostess, but will also contain a dining room and kitchen. I am enclosing a copy of a letter I am sending out to a number of women with the hope that I can find 48 who will be willing to furnish a room."

Mrs. Roosevelt replied on Dec. 22, 1939, and agreed to furnish a room in the new dormitory under construction, later known as Williams Hall. She also shared the names of some prominent women with him, asking that he not use her name in contacting them: Mrs. F. Louis Slade, Mrs. Frank Vanderlip, Mrs. Edgerton Parsons, Mrs. Eugene Myer, Mrs. Ogden Reid, Mrs. Adolph Miller.

The next year, Mrs. Roosevelt wrote to Dr. Bralliar agreeing to give \$100 to help one of her relatives, Helen Roosevelt, pay off her school expenses. Another letter of the same date, July 31, 1940, orders her financial agent Mr. Clarence Pickett of Philadelphia to send \$100 to Madison. He was head of American Friends Service Committee which handled her funds.

"My dear Mrs. Roosevelt," Dr. Bralliar wrote in the final letter in the set, "I wish to thank you very heartily for your kind response. I just learned this evening that Miss Helen Roosevelt is expecting to go to her father's home in Byron, Washington, as soon as commencement is over. It seems that she has a position offered her there as dietitian in a school where she will only have to supervise one meal a day and will put in not more than half or third time and will have the rest of the time to build up her physical health. I am amazed every time I have anything to do with her at her indomitable will and her courageous spirit combined with her very gentle and lovely disposition, a combination one does not often see."

"In case you have not been informed by his widow, this is to tell you of the death of Robert L., Shalkop of North Haven, Conn., who died in August, 2008, at the age of 86. He began his higher education at Madison College, doing very well between 1939 and 1941. (Exact dates not known to me.) He served in the U.S. Army Air Corps in England during World War II and received a Master's degree in anthropology at the University of Chicago afterward. He always spoke fondly of Madison College, of the excellent teaching it offered, and of his enjoyable and memorable days there. While he and I attended other colleges and universities after Madison, we agreed that the quality of the education it offered was remarkable for a school of its size and funding. Shalkop went on to a distinguished career as a director of art museums and a listing in <u>Who's Who in</u> <u>America</u>, but it all began at Madison College.

"Enclosed is a check for our dues. We appreciate reading the Madison <u>Survey</u> and hearing about what many of our friends are doing now. It reminds us of our student days at Madison and brings much appreciation for the education which we received there.

"Joyce and I are in retirement. I never thought that time would last long enough for us to go into retirement when we were in college. I wound up my career as an educator (45 years) in the year 2002 at Columbia Union College where I had been the chairman of the department of education for the previous three years. Prior to that time we had been overseas as missionaries in Russia where I served as the Director or Education for the Euro-Asia Division for seven years, and Joyce worked in the office of the Adventist Dental Clinic as the English accountant. Now I wish that I had not retired, as I love to teach and being at home all day long with not much to do is not my idea of a good time.

"Robert Sutherland was a long time friend and classmate of mine when we "grew up" on the Madison College campus. I have written many accounts of the BUSH family experiences and our individual associations and surrounding adventures.

"My father, Capt. Calvin D. Bush, U.S.Army Ret'd., was in charge of the Food Factory for many years. He was the first one who made Soy Milk in quantities for public consumption. It was "churned out" in my mother's washing machine! My father also made available "fruit sticks" and whole wheat and raisin bread for working students at an affordable price, 7 cents a package or loaf.

"My mother, Frances Keen Bush, RN, was a graduate of Loma Linda. She was a most supportive missionary who made many wool quilts for students who lived in unheated huts on the unpaved road leading to the barn. She also supplied clothing, coats and shoes etc., to teachers, students and dour colored helpers who lived on Larkin Springs Road.

"All of us children, Calvin Jr., Frances Austin and I were very active and much involved in all aspects of campus life: music, art, hospital and industrial activities. My older brother Calvin Jr., had the contract to make all the cement blocks for the library.

"Dr. Ira Gish gave me personal Spanish lessons one summer. Elder Harry Christman was the minister who married my sister Frances to Dick Welch, M.D. I still write to Ruthie and Louis Schutter.

"I wish Madison College could have remained to continue its dedication to educate students on all levels (especially enabling college-aged students to complete accredited degrees.) Well, somehow the vision vanished.

"Robert Sutherland always sent me the Survey and once asked Bertil van Boer, my husband who was chairman of the Madison College Music Department, to come and play flute for a reunion. We were then living in Lake Tahoe area and teaching at Sierra Nevada College. Our busy schedules did not permit the travel time although of course, the visit would have given us a chance to meet many old friends.

"We sometimes have a "Madison Reunion" luncheon at Fletcher, N.C.

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"Again, thank you for the efforts you are making to keep interested alumni aware of "passing members." As we get older, we remember and find renewed contacts.

"I am the last remaining child of the BUSH family but my genealogy research reveals many connections on the highest levels of U.S. history!
