The 2009 Madison College Alumni homecoming was an interesting and fun event, one the most successful in a number of years both in the number attending and the positive comments made by everyone. The major difference this year was meeting separately from the Madison Campus Church. The homecoming was held in the Madison Academy facility which was ideal but nostalgic for most of us because the buildings set on parts of the campus where we once sat in Chapel and went to classes in the Science Building.

Trying to locate the exact sites of the old buildings was difficult as the trees have grown, many sidewalks removed. The only remaining building is the Sutherland home which is now the Heritage House where all the remaining mementos are housed. Some signs mark the location of the original buildings but even standing at the sign it was still hard to remember just how the building was placed. But, many old memories were shared by us and we laughed and had a most enjoyable time remembering so many fond times.

The Friday night presentation in the Academy Chapel included music by the Silvertones of 1955-57, Pat Mitzelfelt July-September, 2009

Silver, Eulene Borton Dodson and Jo Ann Gibbons Jones. The main presentation was by Helen Biggs Socol, a delightful discussion of her time as a student in the late 1930's, then her return as girls dean in the 1950's.

At the morning church service the chapel was filled to overflowing and all the extra chairs that could be found were added. Some estimated that more than 250 folk were there.

Sabbath School was in the chapel and included more music by the Silvertones and Pat Silver, Les Andrus and Jim Closser, a trumpet trio. Harry Mayden '57 gave the study entitled "Mission". The morning speaker was William "Billy" Wilson, former student and Academy Principal 1953-58. I am unable to report on his presentation because I was occupied putting up additional tables in the gym to accommodate all the extra folks who would be coming to lunch!

It is planned that the morning presentation, "The influence of the Madison School on the Church" will be made available on a CD for a very nominal charge to cover the cost. If you would like to get one, just respond to this e-mail and I will arrange to get them mailed out.

After vespers a short Alumni Association business meeting was held. Al Dittes was re-elected president, Mickey Rabuka vice president, Jim Culpepper as secretary/treasurer and new board members Glenda Sheffield Clark and Deryl Christensen were elected and past board members George Stilwell, Brian Traxler, Charles and Ruth Harris, Henry Scoggins, Wilfred Stuyvesant and W. Shaen Sutherland were re-elected. Deryl and Violet Clements Christensen along with Howard Sutton have volunteered to maintain the grounds, and George Stilwell will take care of maintenance at Heritage House.

Sunday morning the final event was a pancake breakfast provided by Howard and Esther Minesinger Sutton.

### **From our Readers**

"It seems like only yesterday that we were at Madison ourselves, but as I recall all that has happened since then, I must admit that it has been 31 years since leaving there. (1978)

"A big thank you to Mrs. Frances Bush, who was our neighbor and inspiration, for Lois to get back to school (1957) and complete her RN and BS, and later to go on to Vanderbilt University for the completion of her Masters degree in Medical/Surgical Nursing. As we talked with her over the hedge between our two houses, she told us that she had seen many arrive at Madison with a desire to complete their nursing degree but put it off until it was too late. When I arrived home after working that day, Lois announced to me that she was starting nurses training that week. It had been a delayed wish for her since, she originally had one year to her credit before we were married in 1949. Mrs. Ziegler required, however, that she start again from the beginning due to that lapse of time.

"It was indeed a busy time for our family living in the old Hilger house where we were able to have Ruby Seibert and Carol Cantrell live with us to give continuing care and housekeeping for our two children, Eileen and Leslie. I started as the Student Finance Officer. and later under Administrator Bob Morris, as a vice president in the hospital and developed personnel and public relations. I felt that Bob Morris was the one big reason that Madison Hospital lasted as long as it did. He did a top notch job of pulling the medical staff together. Lois later was an instructor in the School of Nursing at UTN.

"You will remember the college choir and music department that functioned in the basement of the chapel. I also worked there accompanying the choir under the direction of Francis Cossentine, and always played the Hammond Organ for the church services. Professor Rimmer retired from that when I arrived.

"My brother Bob came to Madison to be the purchasing director and his wife, Irene, was the head nurse in OB. They later went to Pewee Valley and retired in Atlanta where they could be near their son, Steve. Shortly after they purchased a house there, Bob died in 2006. We also continue to keep in contact with Letha Rayburn who worked as an X-ray technician. Her husband Carroll was the Physical Therapist at Madison prior to their years working in Saudi Arabia.

"We returned to Madison in 1971 for the opening of the new church on the hill. The church choir led the procession from the school chapel to the new church. Bob directed the choir, and I was the organist for the opening service. Our pastor was Jack Clarke. By then our children, Eileen and Leslie were in academy. What fun our two families had as they sang together with the Clarke family and Lou Ann, and Elaine Kunau playing the piano.

"Thanks again for keeping us on your mailing list even though we haven't been as involved in the Madison activities. Being able to recall so many of the persons listed in the <u>Survey</u> has been a rewarding time. Best of success to you as you continue to maintain communication for all of us."
